Village Hall Update Village Hall to re-open fully Monday 19th July

I write this on 12th July having just listened to Boris and his scientific and medical wingmen announce the lifting of lockdown. The pandemic is not yet over.

Richardsons' Ramblings

This time I am going to tell you why Scotland is my favourite holiday destination. My love affair with the country started when I was about 10 when my parents bundled my older sister, wire haired fox terrier and me into their Morris Oxford (I think) along with all the camping gear going from Suffolk when there was a serious lack of dual carriageways let alone motorways. When I say camping gear it was not the lightweight equipment you buy today but a heavy canvas tent (and camp beds for mum and dad), bivouac for Jen and me with hurricane lamp and primus stove – you get the picture! I can remember camping above Oban and near Edinburgh – with a box brownie I took a photo of the Firth of Forth Bridge before the middle section was completed. Now only buses and taxis can travel on that bridge as there is a new one for other vehicles.

I thought the lochs and mountains were wonderful and jumped at the chance at 15 to go with my Sea Ranger Group (we then lived in Sussex) to a mixed international camp. It was called *Janus* and was the first ever one for Ranger Guides and Venture Scouts. Two great weeks by Loch Laggan followed (it did rain and there were midges!) with hikes, riding, Highland Games and even swimming (very cold) in the Loch.

In 1979 I introduced Mike to Scotland but we made the mistake of camping by Loch Lomond – a good job he still occasionally smoked cigars as they were very good at keeping the dreaded midges at bay. Sometimes our dogs went but our Giant Schnauzers really preferred to go to their holiday home in the woods near us! We stopped camping many moons ago and have stayed in most regions of Scotland but the only islands we have been on are Skye (before the bridge), Mull and Arran, also visiting Iona and Handa. One of Mike's favourite golf courses (Rosemarkie & Fortrose) is on the Black Isle, which is not an island – great views and the chance to see bottle nosed dolphins. I went onto Cape Wrath, which is the very north-western tip of Scotland, and could only go via a small boat and mini bus. (The alternative is the Cape Wrath Trail).





1994 was the first time we went to the Trossachs staying at Tigh Mor, near Loch Katrine. We have been there several times before heading off north or west. The property was originally a Victorian hotel and featured in Kenneth More's *39 Steps* as a school along with a local tearoom. We have a private field down to Loch Achray where the dogs love to run free but ours have never gone into swim or paddle! The dogs have happily gone with us on the steamship, Sir Walter Scott on Loch Katrine – birthplace of the legendary Rob Toy MacGregor and the setting for some of Sir Walter Scott's poetic works. The Loch was selected to supply much needed fresh water to Glasgow and in 1859 Queen Victoria opened the sluices. She demanded accommodation be built for an overnight stay – Royal Cottage had all its windows shattered by the 21-gun salute!

Spark Somerset

is the local infrastructure charity providing free support and advice to voluntary sector groups and organisation across the county. They run the Volunteer Service, <u>Spark a Change</u>, helping hundreds of people in Somerset to volunteer each year. During those two years I have attended over thirty meetings (latterly by Zoom) and to say that the first six months was a steep learning curve is to put it mildly, however, I now feel much more comfortable representing our Parish and with that in mind, have decided to publish all minutes and presentations on the Holford village website (with thanks here to David Talling) for you all to read and hopefully become more informed on projects being undertaken by EDF and its partners.

The minutes on Station A (currently being de-commissioned) and Station B (still generating electricity) are shown separately from H.P.C. and are managed completely independently with different chairmen and committees.



Hinkley Point C - Monthly Update

A round up of the latest news from Hinkley Point C.

Hinkley Point C's pre-fabrication bunkers are specifically designed to provide protection from the elements. Inside, work has now started on construction of the domed roof for Unit 1. A temporary structure was constructed earlier this year to position the 38 panels which make up the dome roof and facilitate welding. When constructed the dome roof will weigh 200 tonnes, with 500 metres of welding required to join the segments together.

In the Heat Sink area on Unit 1 focus is on "bulk work". This means continued pouring of the circa 100,000m3 of concrete required to construct the Pump House building and associated reinforcement works. The Pump House is a 54 metre high structure, with 35 metres of that sitting below ground.



Holford Parish Council - Chairman's Report July 19th 2021

It has been difficult to move projects forward due to various lockdowns and the large number of people furloughed has resulted in reduced staffing levels. Although remote working has enabled some progress it has often been painfully slow. From today all legal restrictions are to be removed although it seems likely that there are many people who will feel more comfortable continuing to wear masks and keeping their distance in public places.

<u>Planning</u>

An enforcement order has been initiated to remove the building on Strawberry Field but there has been no progress so far and there has been a recent appeal against the enforcement order. This is a matter for the Planning Authority and not within the PC's remit.

We are pleased to announce that the planning application from Falcon Housing to update the facilities at the Portway playground has been approved. As yet they are not able to say when work will begin due to a large backlog of maintenance needs at their houses.

Alfoxton House has also received approval for its change of use to a Buddhist retreat and work is underway. The conservation officer is monitoring progress.

Environment

The 'wilding' of the grass verges on the A39 is an ongoing project. This aim is to establish an area for wild flowers and insects as endorsed by PlantLife. An update will be given under item 10 on the agenda. (See minutes on line)

In an act of extreme vandalism the rookery in the Silk Mills area has been systematically exterminated. The Police have been notified but there does not seem any likelihood that the culprits will be identified. The routine killing of wild birds has been illegal since the beginning of the year unless a farmer can demonstrate that they are damaging crops. It is a sad and shocking event not least because the dead birds were left in a pile on Stowey Lane to cause disgust and a health hazard.

The potholes around the Car Park in the village have been filled again. The noticeboards have been given a face-lift but it has not been entirely successful. The meeting will decide whether to repeat the process or leave it for another year and then have an upgrade or renew.

Traffic and Transport

Holford's Community Speed Watch continues to run smoothly thanks to dedicated volunteers. The weather has been kinder too and they have only had to cancel two watches because of rain. Our Speedwatch is one of approximately 65 in the County. Please see the Holford Parish Council website for more information.

To date The Parish Council has not received any emails, phone calls or letters regarding problems with traffic. However, due to monitoring by the Community

Speedwatch Team it was established that some vehicles do exceed the speed limit on the A39.

The Parish Council's Traffic Team (Emma Cavendish, Mike Copleston and Stephen Campbell) continues to investigate ways to reduce speeding on the A39. New signage has been agreed by SCC Traffic Management and we have been promised a time schedule for the work to be carried out. However, in the response from Traffic Management it said that it had to be completed with the financial year (which ends next April.) Hopefully it will happen sooner rather than later. The Parish Council is looking into applying for a grant from EDF for the purchase of two Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) but there are strict requirements for the application which may take some time to fulfil.

The Chairman is in the process of drafting a questionnaire to be distributed to all Parishioners to assess their concerns regarding traffic. However, this will involve costs for postage and printing so will be debated under item 10 Traffic.

The Chairman attended a 'Bus Back Better' Stakeholder Engagement event via a Zoom conference. The Government is proposing to de-regulate bus services and give local authorities the power to decide how best to serve their communities. SWT council has begun a consultation on BSIP (Bus Service Improvement Plan) with the benefit of a large pot of government funding. SCC requests input from local people as to their requirements from a bus service. Any local person can contact SCC with their comments. John Woodman and Tim Reynolds are the transport contacts. We can only dream of a reliable, hourly bus service in Holford.

Local Government

Local people voted for a two council system rather than one large council. The Government will need to confirm which model they will approve.*

Hinkley Point are shortly opening a new visitor centre for the public at Cannington Court and they have invited any member of the Parish Council to go along and see the new centre in August prior to its opening to the public.

Mediterranean seafood stew

A lovely, sunny supper not as complicated as it looks! Serves 4 - 6

2 tbs olive oil 1 large onion, chopped 1 - 2 medium hot red chilli, deseeded and chopped 2 tsp smoked sweet paprika Large pinch saffron 2 strips orange zest 2 bay leaves Sprig of thyme, leaves stripped off Lots of chopped parsley to serve 2 x 400g cans of chopped tomatoes 350ml dry white wine (less will do in which case add more stock!) 200ml well flavoured chicken or fish stock 250gm prawns, thawed if frozen



500gm mussels* cooked briefly and removed from the shells 300gm other fish such as salmon, cod or squid

Sauté the onion and chilli in the olive oil until soft but not brown, then add the garlic and cook briefly. Stir in the paprika, zest and herbs and cook for 1 minute more. Add the tomatoes, stock and season. Simmer for 15 minutes. Add the fish and simmer gently for 5 minutes then add the mussels and prawns and heat through for 5 minutes more. Finally add the squid (it will become very tough if cooked for more than a minute or two).

Serve with chunks of a hearty, flavoursome bread and the chopped parsley.

*Quick short cut : If you don't want to pre-cook your own mussels you can buy frozen shelled ones in which case just throw in a handful but you will miss out on the lovely juice so add more stock or wine!

Quote from. Avon and Somerset Constabulary:

"SPEEDING IS NOT HARMLESS

Nobody plans to crash their vehicle, yet hundreds of thousands of people do this every year. If you drive for long enough, sooner or later something will go wrong on one of your journeys. A major reason that speed limits exist is so that when the unexpected happens, the consequences are less serious both for the people around you and for you yourself.

The difference of a couple of miles per hour can literally mean the difference between life and death. The faster someone is driving, the less time they have to stop if something unexpected happens and the more powerful a collision will be if they do not stop in time. Every mile per hour taken off your speed increases safety.

- Speed is one of the main factors in fatal road accidents.
- The risk of death is approximately four times higher when a pedestrian is hit at 40 mph then at 30 mph
- Fatal accidents are four times as likely on rural roads as urban roads. "

Holford has recently had a fatal accident within an area that the CSW consider should be a 40mph zone, providing a staged speed reduction from the 50mph A39 to our 30mph village zone.
