A good few people turned up and by the end of the morning, we had enough funds to pay for the hire of the village hall for a year, and to help pay for a couple of speakers. The rest is history. In time, when they moved to Kilve and established a wonderful garden there and hosted the summers garden party for the group, that without their contribution, it would have been a very different story, so Erl and I would like to say how much their commitment to the HGG from those early days until only just recently when Pauline retired, has been very much appreciated. After 3 years Phil and Pauline moved to Shurton Court and then to Stringston. When Phil's mum, Millie came back from Hastings they all lived at Cernbrook in Holford.

2003 saw their last move in West Somerset to Kilve where Phil used his skills in renovating and creating a lovely home at Higher Hill Cottage. Throughout their time here Pauline and Phil had various dogs invariably re-homing or rescuing them. The trio now with them is Molly (a lurcher found abandoned and starving in Stringston), Juno (a terrier who much preferred living with them) and Rufus (Chihuahua cross who didn't want to live in Australia).

Both Pauline and Phil were stalwart supporters of St Mary's Church in Stringston having served on the Parish Parochial Council for over 30 years. Both had served as secretary and Phil was a churchwarden for many years and was invaluable in helping with running repairs of the church.

Pauline was an inaugural member of Holford Gardeners Group, joining the committee and chairing the Flower Show committee from its first one in 2005 till 2018. When Erl stepped down as chair of the Group in 2013 Pauline stepped up to the role. She may have been technologically averse but she kept a good handle on proceedings with a good sense of humour, and we enjoyed very good cakes!

When Sue Wicks started up Holford Art Group Phil went along and over the years we could all see his progression – visitors to Flower Shows and exhibitions would see the imagination and flair he put into his art. No doubt Phil will be missed by the Group as he was one of the mainstays with Sue having moved away. Barrie Palmer BEM and Lesley Mallon, of Gwyndene, Back Lane, Holford.

Lesley was born in Manchester but lived most of her formative years in Blackpool, where her parents ran a B&B. As a teenager they moved to Cardiff. On completing her college studies as a shorthand typist, she worked for various banks, then an entertainment agency working with the likes of Cliff Richard, Des O'Connor and Joe Pasquale. On moving to Taunton Lesley worked in the office at M and S and when Barrie started with the RSC, Lesley managed to get a transfer to M & S in Stratford-Upon-Avon, working on menswear and kidswear, but even managed to sort out a couple of bras for Judy Dench, who was appearing as Mistress Quickly in Merry Wives of Windsor the musical! (Judy was looking for a good balcony bra!!) In 2016, Barrie Joined Lesley in M and S on short term contracts between theatre work. They both continued working there until 1st April this year, Lesley completing more than 25 years' service.

Barrie is responsible for the cancer centre at Musgrove Park Hospital, The Beacon Centre. He started a Campaign in 2000 to have a centre built in Somerset, as he had been taking friends of his to Bristol for radiotherapy treatment. His charity, SURE, The Somerset Unit for Radiotherapy

Equipment has now raised in excess of Five and a half million pounds providing all of the equipment for the unit and as a result has made the unit a National Centre of Excellence. Barrie was recognised for his work in the 2020 Queen's Birthday Honours List by being awarded the British Empire Medal. That was presented last year by the Lord Lieutenant of Somerset. In May this year both Barrie and Lesley attended a Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace. Whilst waiting to go into the garden they received a message and photo of their second grandchild Ruby, who had been born at 1pm that day!



Barrie is a Freemason, a member of the Emergency Services Lodge here in Somerset and also the Chelsea Lodge in London, which is the entertainers lodge, with members such as Rick Wakeman, Freddie 'Parrotface' Davies and Roger DeCourcey and Nookie bear! This year Barrie was appointed as the Provincial Grand Membership Officer for Somerset, so if anyone is interested in joining, please let him know!

Both of their families live in Taunton and the travel time from Stratford to Taunton, on a good day when the M5 is open is 2 hours. They

decided that they needed to be back in Somerset. They eventually found, for them the perfect house next to the Plough! They both said that they love their house, the village of Holford and the locals that they have met so far. Everyone has been so welcoming and friendly.





Ratatouille chutney recipe



For those of you with a glut of greenhouse produce and a decent one for all those courgettes!

This is a classic chutney, delicious with bread and cheese and a dollop can even be added to a curry for a bit of extra zing.

Makes 2½ litres But you can always halve the quantities

- 500ml cider vinegar
- 400g brown sugar (soft light/dark brown sugar)
- 1 tbsp mixed spice
- 2 tbsp yellow mustard seeds
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 2 good sprigs rosemary, leaves removed and chopped
- 4 onions, peeled and roughly chopped
- 1kg courgettes (small or large), diced
- 1kg tomatoes, roughly chopped
- 4 eating apples, peeled, cored and diced
- 300g sultanas
- Maldon salt

Method

Put the vinegar, 300ml water, sugar, herbs and spices in a very large pan. Heat, stirring, until the sugar dissolves. Add the rest of the ingredients with a good pinch of salt.

Bring back to a simmer and cook uncovered for two hours until darkened, thick and chutneylike. Stir regularly, as chutney catches easily and will ruin the flavour if it burns. It's ready when you draw a spoon through the mix and it leaves a visible trail of the pan!

Pour into sterilised jars while still hot, seal and leave in a cool, dark place for at least three weeks before opening.

We have been kept busy these past few months with our attempts to start a Community Review, trying to make sense of the proposed Local Community Networks and the recruitment of a new Parish Clerk. It was with much sadness that we received the news of the death of Queen Elizabeth II, just a few months after the joyous celebration of her 75th Jubilee. It was widely agreed that it was right to postpone our meeting in September during the National Period of Mourning, despite the greatly anticipated visit from the Police and Crime Commissioner.

Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC)

The visit from the Avon and Somerset PCC, Mark Shelford, has been rearranged and he will now be addressing our parish council meeting on Monday 14 November. Please come along if you have any policing matters to raise with him.

Parish Clerk

We will be bidding farewell to our Parish Clerk, Hema Stanley, who has been an integral part of the Parish Council for many years and who has steered the new Councillors through our first months of learning the ropes. We are currently in the process of arranging interviews with our applicants and the successful candidate will hopefully be starting with us at the end of October.

Community Review

In August we were successful in our bid to take part in the Somerset Council funded Smart Communities Community Review Project. Thank you to the kind parishioners who expressed interest in joining us. Unfortunately, the Parish Council have had to make the decision to withdraw from this project as there were not enough volunteers to sit on the steering group.

Speed Indication Device and 20 mph limit

Thanks to the successful bid submitted by the previous councillors, we have now received a cheque from the Police Community Trust to cover the purchase of a SIDs which we hope to install on the A39, with permission from the Highways Authority. We hope this will contribute to the work by the Community Speedwatch Group to deter some of the speeding traffic on the main road through the village. We are also looking into the feasibility of getting permission to reduce the speed limit to 20 mph, as has been done recently in other parts of the County.

Combwich to Hinkley Point Shared Use Cycle Path

Councillor Stuart Moffat attended the Public Consultation meeting about the proposed new 9.3km cycle path which will further connect the existing cycle routes from Bridgwater and Cannington. If you have any preference for this to go ahead, we would urge you to fill in the online questionnaire at <u>www.edfenergy.com/cycleway</u>

War Memorial Trees

We have had an offer from the Quantock Landscape Partnership Scheme to supply us with more saplings to replace the dead ones up at the War Memorial Trees. We would be grateful for any offers from residents to "adopt a sapling" to ensure they make it through any period of drought during their early stages.

Greater Quantock Landscape Development Fund

The Quantock Hills AONB Service are seeking applications from community groups for landscape improvement projects such planting orchards, trees or hedges, creating wild meadows, restoring ponds or heritage walls.

Local Community Network (LCN)

The Public Consultation on the development Local Community Networks will be running until 17th October. These LCNs will replace the current District Councils as a way of representing local communities as Committees of the new Unitary Council. The boundaries, roles and names of the LCNs are still undecided but its appears thee will be no devolution of assets and services to them. The current consultation keeps Holford grouped with other parishes from current West Somerset District Council, but the size of this groups varies across the three options. We will keep you informed as things develop, but if you want to know more about this in the meantime or have any questions, there will be a public engagement session at West Somerset Hose, Williton on 10th October from 10-4pm.

Portway Play Area

Falcon Housing expect to be finishing the work at the old play area this autumn, with the levelling of the ground, reseeding with grass and installing seating and a basketball hoop.

Mountain biking on the Quantock Hills

We have had complaints of antisocial behaviour from mountain bikers on our local tracks, and particularly during the event in September.
